100 DAYS TO GO TO ONE BIG PARTY

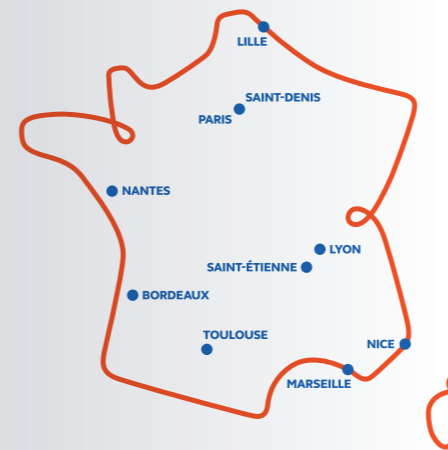


The 10th in history, Rugby World Cup France 2023 kicks off in 100 days' time. Having staged a memorable tournament in 2007, France is preparing to welcome the world of rugby for a second time, with major celebrations planned around the country.

To mark the 100 days to go countdown, France 2023 and World Rugby have chosen to give fans from France and around the world a taste of what promises to be an exceptional event, both on and off the pitch.

One of France's most iconic monuments, the Arc de Triomphe is synonymous with outpourings of public joy and celebrations of sporting triumphs. On 31 May, 2023, exactly 100 days before the opening match between France and New Zealand, it will light up in the colours of Rugby World Cup 2023.

To mark the occasion, a three-minute film of key moments in Rugby World Cup history will be projected onto the famous monument, which looks out onto the Champs Elysées. The film will then be screened across France, on iconic landmarks and buildings in the other cities hosting the tournament.

WEBB ELLIS CUP THE STAR GUEST

The Webb Ellis Cup has arrived in France in the company of world champion Tendai Mtawarira, aka The Beast. After making the journey from South Africa with Emirates, a Rugby World Cup 2023 Worldwide Partner, the 117-time Springbok prop will accompany the trophy through a programme of activities showcasing French culture and expertise.

The Beast will pay a visit to chef Julien Duboué's restaurant and pastry chef Christelle Brua's workshop, while also stopping off at Montmartre and an amateur rugby club in Gennevilliers. Mtawarira will end his day by placing the Webb Ellis Cup on top of the Arc de Triomphe, triggering a projection onto this iconic French monument and in the host cities.

**A SUSTAINABLE MEDAL
COMBINING BOLDNESS
AND TRADITION**

We are proud to mark the 100 days to go countdown by unveiling the Rugby World Cup 2023 medals, which have been engraved by the Monnaie de Paris, France's historic minting institution and the designer of its greatest decorations, such as the Legion of Honour and the National Order of Merit.

Respectful of current and future environmental issues, the medals are made from recycled mobile phone components collected with the assistance of Orange, Official Sponsor of Rugby World Cup 2023.

The Möbius strip that wraps around the Rugby World Cup 2023 logo on the back of the medal is a unique and continuous link connecting the players to the fans, rugby to society, and France to the world. And because Rugby World Cup 2023 draws its strength from the regions of France, their uniqueness and specific characteristics, the 10 host cities are represented through their very own signature.

The iconic Webb Ellis Cup featured on the back of the medal is the ultimate prize for every men's rugby player and has been awarded to the Rugby World Cup winners every four years since 1987. It is named after William Webb Ellis, a student at Rugby School in England, who made sporting history in the autumn of 1823 by picking up the ball during a football match and running with it, in defiance of the rules in force at the time. It was a disruptive action that defied the norms, and its 200th anniversary is being celebrated in 2023.

Bold yet traditional and combining nods to their history and avant-garde spirit, the medals embody France and rugby at their strongest. They are topped by a depiction of the Arc de Triomphe, the monument where the country celebrates its greatest achievements and the scene of unforgettable outpourings of joy.



A FOCUS ON PLAYER WELLBEING

Player wellbeing and experience will be of prime importance at Rugby World Cup 2023, with player welfare being the number one priority for World Rugby, the game's global governing body.

For the first time in the history of the tournament, each participating nation will benefit from a minimum of five rest days between each match. This will help players to recover from their last match and optimise preparations.



New technologies that help prevent, identify and manage head injuries will also be rolled out at Rugby World Cup 2023, complementing strict and proven concussion protocols that ensure a safe return to play. In addition to educational programmes designed to raise player awareness among the 20 participating nations, each team will also name a 33-player squad, up from 31 in 2019, to allow for more rotation.

FRANCE 2023 IMMERSIVE EXPERIENCES

France 2023 Official Hospitalitys will offer an immersive experience at every Rugby World Cup 2023 matches. Inside lounges and corporate boxes, at the heart of a magnified atmosphere unveiling France's excellence, each guest will discover the participating teams and their culture, while travelling inside France's regions and their local products.

Less than 60,000 hospitality offers are still available throughout the nine host venues. All offers and official agencies can be found on: hospitality2023.rugbyworldcup.com.

With more than 280,000 tickets already sold, the Official Travel programme for Rugby World Cup 2023 has already exceeded all previous records, to showcase the best of France to international fans.

With 100 days to go to the opening match, less than 50,000 tickets and travel packages are still available. All offers are available on travel2023.rugbyworldcup.com, with the help of 24 Official Travel Agents and 41 authorised sub-agents, operating in 25 countries.





1823 - 2023 RUGBY'S BICENTENARY

Thanks to the 10th men's Rugby World Cup, the game will be celebrating its bicentenary in style in 2023. It all started in the English town of Rugby in 1823, when a student by the name of William Webb Ellis picked the ball up during a game of football and started running with it, in contravention of the rules of the game.

Many changes have taken place since rugby's inception, with the pace of change picking up after the inaugural Rugby World Cup in 1987 and the advent of professionalism in 1995. Nearly three decades on from that turning point in the game's history, rugby retains an innate desire to innovate and improve the sport for its players and fans.

Rugby World Cup 2023 will pit the 20 best teams in the world against each other, with 19 of them intent on wresting the crown from reigning champions South Africa, who emerged triumphant last time out in Japan in 2019. The match schedule is exciting, with some new match-ups in store as well as the resumption of old rivalries. All in all, it promises to be a great spectacle for fans in France and around the world.

Drawn in Pool A, the hosts France will face New Zealand in an opening match between two of the competition's most iconic teams, an encounter that has the makings of an epic. Completing the pool are Italy, Uruguay and Namibia.

Defending champions South Africa and Ireland will face each other for the first time at a Rugby World Cup in Pool B, which also includes Scotland, Tonga and Romania.

THE MOST COMPETITIVE OF RUGBY WORLD CUPS

It is a case of old foes reunited in Pool C, where Wales, Australia and Fiji will meet for the third consecutive tournament. Joining them are Georgia and Portugal, returning for a first Rugby World Cup appearance since 2007.

Finally, Chile will be making their Rugby World Cup debut in Pool D, where they will be up against 2019 runners-up England, Japan, Argentina and Samoa.

« The last four years have passed by at a rapid pace and it is almost surreal that we are 100 days out from Rugby World Cup 2023 in France. Given the meticulous planning by the organisers and the fantastic stadiums and facilities in the host cities, we believe it will be a memorable Rugby World Cup for the participating teams and fans attending the event. AN HISTORIC FIRST FOR CHILE AND SOUTH AMERICA

A fresh wind is blowing through Rugby World Cup 2023, with Chile qualifying for the first time. *Los Cóndores* upset the odds in getting the better of the two North American giants in qualifying, beating Canada 54-46 on aggregate and then USA 52-51 over two legs in two thrilling play-off ties.

The presence of three South American teams at Rugby World Cup 2023 is another first and provides tangible proof of the development of rugby in the region, driven in particular by the success of the continent's professional league.

Elsewhere, Portugal will be making their Rugby World Cup return, having qualified for the first time in France in 2007. Patrice Lagisquet's side secured the last ticket to Rugby World Cup 2023 by winning the Final Qualification Tournament following a dramatic draw with USA in the deciding match.

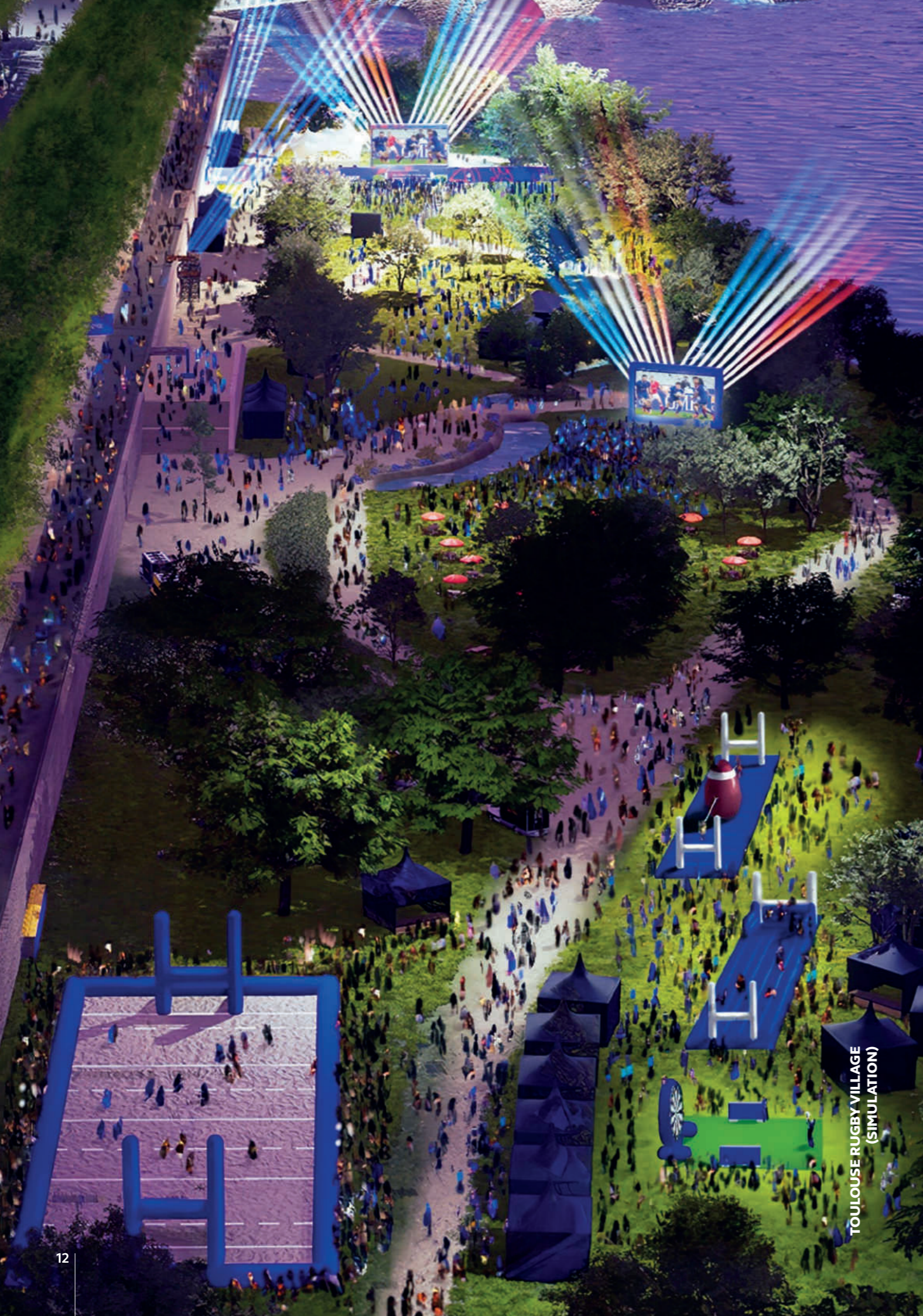

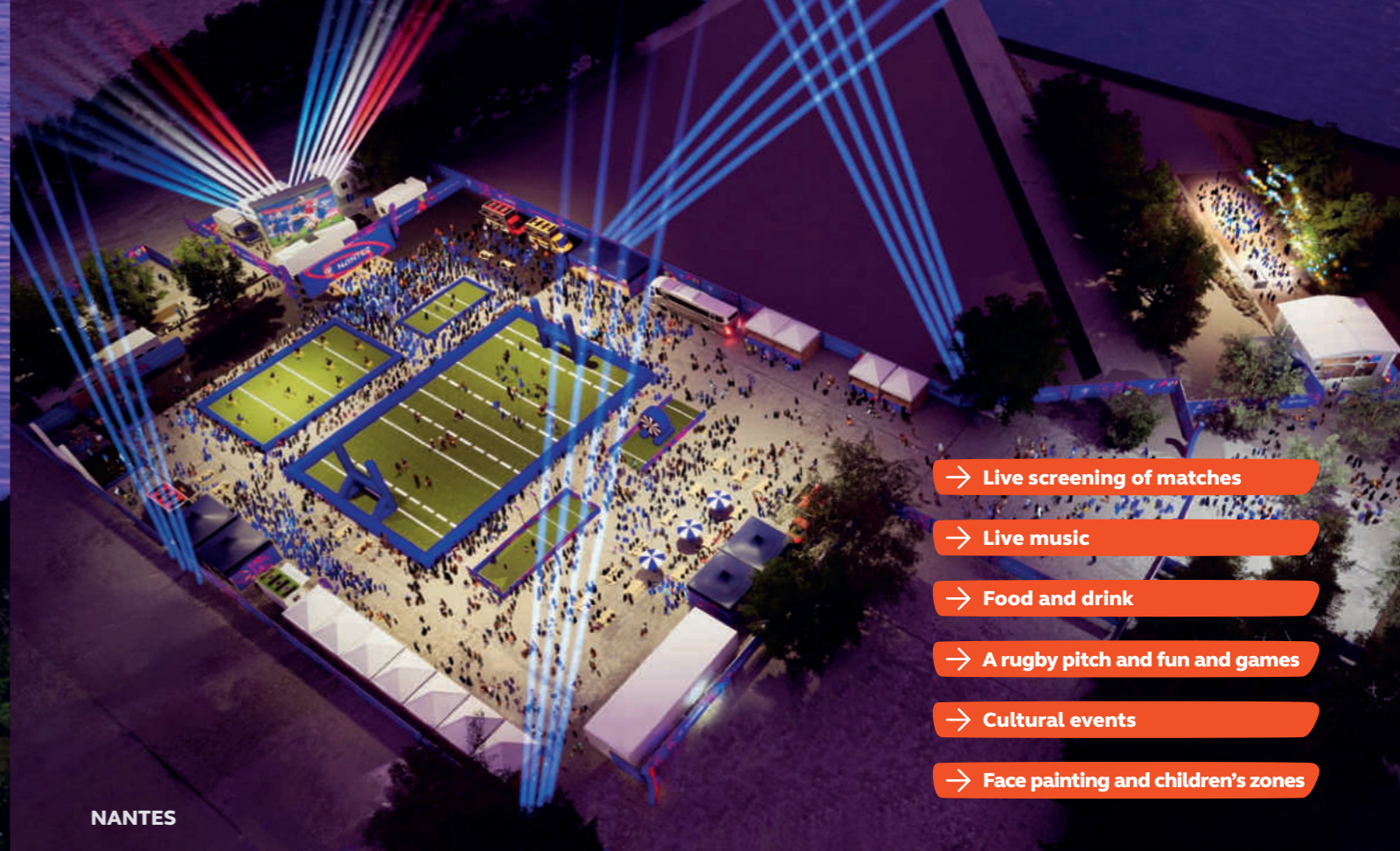

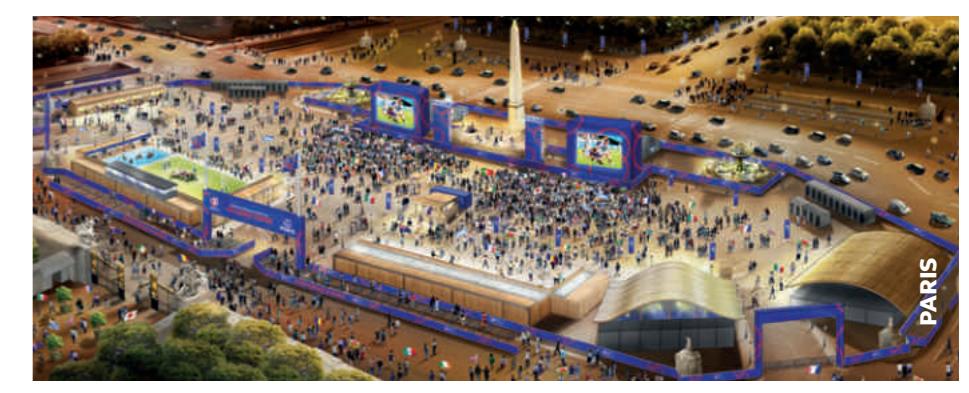

POSITIVE-IMPACT PROJECTS

Rugby World Cup 2023 aims to be a positive-impact competition, setting new standards in social responsibility, inclusion and sustainable development for major international sporting events. Looking beyond mere words, organisers want to provide specific evidence of their actions, through innovative projects, some of which are already up and running with others soon to be rolled out.

CAMPUS 2023 AMBITIONS POUR LE SPORT

Campus 2023 is the name of the apprentice training centre launched by France 2023. In total, 1,400 young people between the ages of 18 and 30 will benefit from the staging of Rugby World Cup 2023 and train for jobs in sport, tourism and event security. Campus 2023's goal is to leave a legacy to the sports movement after 2023 and to ensure these young people remain in employment long after the tournament has finished.



LA MÊLÉE DES CHŒURS

The Mêleé des Chœurs (literally "the choir scrum") will give more than 7,000 young people the opportunity to sing the national anthems of the 20 teams that have qualified for Rugby World Cup 2023, as part of an educational project focusing on the cultures of the participating nations. The choirs will be on the pitch at the opening match and the knockout matches of Rugby World Cup 2023.

NOT TO MENTION...

THE 2023 NATIONAL NEIGHBOURHOOD TOURNAMENT: engaging with 5,000 young people aged eight to 13 and from disadvantaged areas, using rugby as an educational tool to promote social integration.

JOB DATING: working with socially excluded people and promoting the integration of 250 refugees in the workplace through rugby.

RUGBY COEUR 2023

The Rugby World Cup 2023 Endowment Fund aims to finance 500 meaningful projects that promote education, inclusion and equality. *Rugby au Coeur* ("Rugby at Heart") is looking to contribute to the development of rugby in other areas in order to meet the challenges facing society, particularly in schools, hospitals and disadvantaged areas.



LE XV DE LA GASTRONOMIE FRANCE 2023

Twenty-three stars of French cooking, each of them gifted and passionate about rugby, will put their mastery and know-how at the service of Rugby World Cup 2023 as part of the *XV de la Gastronomie* ("Gastronomy XV"). Their main task during the tournament? To design the menus – based on raw, seasonal and local produce – to be offered in the dressing rooms and official hospitality lounges.

RUGBY IS MY PRIDE: a programme that engages with LGBTQIA+ communities and highlights the fight against homophobia, transphobia and biphobia.
